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

The oath states that the Code of Conduct has been read and that the provisions of the Code will be abided by.

The Oath of Office is to be made by the successful candidate within 3 months of being declared elected and is to be made before and witnessed by the Chief Executive Officer.

Councillor Linda Hancock made an Oath of Office immediately after the Declaration of the Poll on Tuesday 22 March 2022 and will serve on Council up to the next general election, which is due to be held in October 2024.

- subject to the exercise of a delegated function, duty or power of Council.

Examples of a Councillor Briefings may include:

- On-site inspections,
- Consultative Meetings with residents, developers, consultants
- Meetings with local organisations, Government Departments, statutory authorities, and local politicians.

REDIVISION OF VICTORIAN ELECTORAL BOUNDARIES 2020-2021

ITEM 4

PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to update Council in relation to the stage two submissions received by the Electoral Boundaries Commission and to note the final boundaries report to come into effect at the Victorian State Election in November 2022.

STRATEGIC / POLICY ISSUES

The following directions contained in Maroondah 2040: Our Future Together and the Council Plan 2021-2025 (Year 1: 2021-2022) provide the strategic framework that underpins the purpose of this report.

Outcome Area: A well governed and empowered community

<u>Our Vision:</u> In 2040, Maroondah will be an empowered community actively engaged in local decision making, led by an innovative community inspired council that collaborates regionally and proactively champions local needs.

Key Directions 2021 – 2025:

8.11 Work in partnership to advocate for and champion the needs and aspirations of the community to Victorian and Australian levels of government, service providers and the business sector.

Priority Action 2021-2022:

Advocate on key local issues on behalf of the Maroondah community, including in the lead up to the State and Federal Government elections in 2022.

BACKGROUND

To ensure the number of electors within each State Government District and Region remains approximately the same over time, the *Electoral Boundaries Commission Act 1982* requires that State electoral boundaries are adjusted. This formal process is called a 'redivision' and must take place after every second Victorian State general election.

The Electoral Boundaries Commission (EBC) has been conducting a redivision of electoral boundaries for both Houses of State Parliament to ensure that each vote in Victorian State elections has an equal value and that each elector is represented equally in the Victorian Parliament.

The EBC released the final report which included the final boundaries on the 28 October 2021 before the State redivision closed. In November 2021 the final boundaries report was lodged with the Central Plan Office with new boundaries to come into effect at the Victorian State Election to be held in November 2022.

ISSUE / DISCUSSION

The following information provides details relative to those proposed changes for the Districts (Legislative Assembly otherwise known as the Lower House of State Parliament) affecting the City of Maroondah.


Proposed Changes:

The key elements of the proposal/changes can be seen below. Current district maps are included for comparison.

Bayswater District:

- As the District needed to expand to gain more electors, the EBC have proposed to shift the boundaries to the Dandenong Creek - Knox LGA boundary in the north and High Street-Burwood Highway in the south.
- Therefore, the EBC proposed to adjust the Croydon District boundaries, which currently run along major roads and a locality boundary, to Dandenong Creek - coinciding with the Knox LGA. This impacts 8,434 electors transferred from Bayswater District to Croydon District.
- The additional transfer of 3,649 electors from the Monbulk District places most of the Kilsyth locality into the Croydon District and 986 electors from the Ringwood District, similarly uniting Croydon South.
- These changes mean that sections of the City of Maroondah no longer sit within the Bayswater District.


New Bayswater Electoral District:

Previous Bayswater Electoral District:




Croydon District:

- Currently this District is below the quota and needs to expand to gain electors.
- The EBC proposes that a southward extension is the best option.
- Proposing adjusting the District's boundaries, which currently run along major roads and a locality boundary to Dandenong Creek is coincident with the northern boundary of the Knox LGA.
- This impacts 8,434 electors who have transferred from the Bayswater District to Croydon District.
- Additional transfers of 3,649 electors from Monbulk will unite the Kilsyth locality in Croydon and 986 electors from Ringwood.
- Similarly, uniting Croydon South is also proposed. This will bring the Croydon District within the permitted tolerance at 7.71% above the average.

Forest Hill District to become the Glen Waverley District:


- The EBC determined that the Forest Hill District would be abolished, and a new district created as Glen Waverley which would incorporate the bottom left corner of Ringwood adjacent to Eastlink.
- The new Glen Waverley District would encompass an additional 27,205 voters from Forest Hill, 19,676 voters from Mount Waverley and 4,522 voters from Mulgrave.
- The EBC report noted that Maroondah City Council made a submission at Stage 2 for a small portion of the Glen Waverley district to be included in the Ringwood District to align with Council's preference to ensure that communities of interest are not split, or portions of the community are not disadvantaged through dislocation from natural/behavioural centres of attraction. This also aligns with the preference for Maroondah not to be fragmented into the future and ensuring ease of municipality coverage for processes of consultation and focused advocacy.
- The EBC report noted the following response to Council's submission:

Transferring a small area of the Glen Waverley District to the Ringwood District. The Council argued that the area bounded by Canterbury Road, Eastlink and Dandenong Creek and Heatherdale Road should be included in the Ringwood District to avoid splitting communities and further division of the Council across districts. The EBC has not made this adjustment as Eastlink provides a stronger boundary than Heatherdale Road, which is a small local street in this area.


Ringwood District:

- At 12.87% below quota, Ringwood needed to expand to gain electors and compensate for the loss of electors to the Warrandyte District in the north.
- Abolishing Forest Hill District would allow Ringwood to gain 2,742 electors as the boundary shifts to the much clearer and more familiar Canterbury Road.
- In addition, the western boundary with Box Hill District was adjusted to gain 5,324 electors.
- Ringwood District gained most of the electors required by moving the boundary with Bayswater District south to the Dandenong Creek - Knox LGA boundary.
- Because of a number of these changes, Ringwood would be lifted to within quota and would be expected to remain so beyond 2026.
- Moreover, boundaries and the District shape of Ringwood would be improved, and the commercial centre would stay united within the District.



Previous Ringwood Electoral District:





Warrandyte District:

- Well under quota at 10.69% below the district average as at the 30 November 2020
- Balancing all views along with geography and communities of the district area, the EBC is proposing the following:
 - Extend Warrandyte east to gain 4,091 electors in Chirnside Park from the Evelyn District
 - The South-East to gain 4,241 electors from a part of Ringwood Nth and the remaining share of Park Orchards from the Croydon District
 - The South to include 4,853 electors also in Ringwood North from the Ringwood District.
- Noting that these changes would more than compensate for the loss of electors to the Bulleen District will bring the Warrandyte District well within the 5.47% quota above the District average whilst accommodating for future voter rates of decline.
- The EBC also considers that it is appropriate to retain Warrandyte North within the District given this was supported by the majority of submitters.


New Warrandyte Electoral District:

The EBC received 127 written submissions with 25 presentations conducted at the public hearings held on Tuesday 17 and Wednesday 18 August 2021 that took into account the information and discussions in submissions before preparing the final boundaries report released in October 2021.

The breakdown of those submissions received were from the following groups:

- Five registered Political Parties
- One Member of Parliament
- Six municipal Councils
- Four Councillors
- 18 organisations
- With the remainder from private individuals

CONCLUSION

The EBC's new Glen Waverley District replaces the Forest Hill District which was not consistent with the submission made by Maroondah City Council. The City of Maroondah will now consist of four districts; Ringwood, Croydon, Warrandyte and Glen Waverley.

FREEDOM OF ENTRY: 22ND ENGINEER REGIMENT

PURPOSE

To consider a request from the Australian Army 22nd Engineer Regiment to be granted 'Freedom of Entry' to the City of Maroondah and to be able to exercise its 'Freedom of Entry' rights in conjunction with the Maroondah Festival held in November 2022.

STRATEGIC / POLICY ISSUES

The following directions contained in Maroondah 2040: Our Future Together and the Council Plan 2021-2025 (Year 1: 2021-2022) provide the strategic framework that underpins the purpose of this report.

Outcome Area: A well governed and empowered community

<u>Our Vision:</u> In 2040, Maroondah will be an empowered community actively engaged in local decision making, led by an innovative community inspired Council that collaborates regionally and proactively champions local needs.

Key Directions 2021 – 2025:

8.1 Provide community inspired governance that is transparent, accessible, inclusive and accountable.

BACKGROUND

'Freedom of Entry' is a historical ceremonial privilege, which a City may bestow upon a military regiment. It allows the regiment to enter the City 'with swords drawn, bayonets fixed, drums beating, bands playing and colours flying'. Whilst the granting of 'Freedom of Entry' gives no real rights or privileges to the regiment, it is recognition of outstanding achievement and an honour granted by the Council. Once granted, 'Freedom of Entry' may be exercised on other occasions by the regiment with the consent of Council.

The 22nd Engineer Regiment are a combination of the previously known 4th Combat Engineer Regiment and the 22nd Construction Regiment.

Prior this request, the 4th Combat Engineer Regiment had been granted 'Freedom of the City' to the City of Maroondah in 2000 and before that the Cities of Ringwood and Croydon had granted the 7th Field Engineer Regiment 'Freedom of the City.'

The 22nd Engineer Regiment would be interested in exercising its right to the 'Freedom of Entry to the City' at the Maroondah Festival 2022 as per past practice where the Australian Air Force Cadets – 408 Squadron and 4th Wing exercised this right at the Maroondah Festival held on Sunday 10 November 2019.

ISSUE / DISCUSSION

Parade Route:

All logistical arrangements, including finalisation of a suitable route for the Parade, will be undertaken in liaison with the Festival Team.

FREEDOM OF ENTRY: 22ND ENGINEER REGIMENT Cont'd ITEM 5

At this stage, the following route is proposed:

- The Regiment's drop off point will be in the carpark located off Norton Road at the south end of Fred Geale Oval.
- The Regiment will assemble at the south end of Fred Geale Oval in preparation for the Parade.
- The Parade will march north along Norton Road, turning left into the carpark at Town Park where they will continue to the 'challenge point' along the carpark area which will be sectioned off to cars, at which point the Regiment will exercise its 'Freedom of Entry'.
- The Parade will then continue past Keystone Hall on the right, across the footbridge and back onto Fred Geale Oval where the Official Party will be waiting.
- Following a review of the parade and the Mayor's address, the Parade will proceed to the end of the Oval.

Official Party & Guests:

Guests will include the Mayor, Councillors, Chief Executive Officer, local Members of Parliament, 22nd Engineer Regiment including the Principal Guest and Host Officer and members of the Victoria Police. The Official Party will consist of the Principal Guest, Host Officer and Mayor.

Presentation Scroll:

As part of the conferring of 'Freedom of Entry', a formal scroll is prepared by Council for presentation to the Regiment for display at its Headquarters. The scroll is prepared by hand by a calligrapher and depicts the Coat of Arms of both Council and the Regiment, in addition to the formal wording of the exercising of 'Freedom of Entry'. Two digitally printed scrolls with gilding on watercolour paper will be created, with one to be presented to the Regiment as part of the Parade and one for display at Council.

Refreshments:

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Official Party, the Regiment and guests will gather for light refreshments; the location of which will be finalised in conjunction with the Festival Team.

As the event is being held in conjunction with the Maroondah Festival, there will be some cost savings in regard to staging and road closures, which will form part of the Festival budget. The expenditure for the Freedom of Entry aspect of the Festival is covered within the budget.

BACKGROUND

In mid-2020 Regional Development Australia (RDA) provided funding for the Bayswater Business Precinct (BBP) Transformation Strategy. This was delivered in partnership with the three BBP councils of Maroondah, Knox and Yarra Ranges and RDA staff situated within DJPR. SGS were the appointed consultants. The Transformation Strategy was formally received on 10th December 2021.

Throughout 2020 and 2021 the consultant team, RDA and the partner councils worked collaboratively to fully understand the scope and deliverables of the Transformation Strategy. Numerous workshops and presentations were undertaken with the core delivery team, businesses were interviewed for input and over 20 specialised staff across the three councils were consulted to provide feedback on the daft versions. This involved individual conversations and feedback resulting in close to 200 specific written comments then followed more targeted themed groups joining together across the councils to provide input relating to their expertise (planning, transport, sustainability and Economic development).

During this time there were several setbacks that delayed the delivery of the Transformation Strategy. The impacts of COVID on all parties required the implementation of remote methods of working, which were new to many at the time bringing with it technical challenges and impacting the delivery of key agreed elements of the consultant Project Plan. The BBP team was successful in negotiating with the consultant and RDA to ensure these aspects were finalised and included to a high standard.

ISSUE / DISCUSSION

The Transformation Strategy

The key message of the Transformation Strategy is that without considerable intervention and investment the BBP will not be able to

- maintain enough jobs to support the projected population growth in the outer eastern region
- retain and attract businesses to stay or relocate to the Precinct
- remain competitive in the local and global economy

The Transformation Strategy details the priority areas where councils and its advocacy/delivery partners should focus its attention to ensure the precinct remains viable, attracts the right kind of jobs and investment and promotes its key strengths.

This is described through the 20 actions, with a focus on spatial intervention (i.e. planning, transport, environment and amenity). However, underpinning these is the principal action of reimagining the Governance of the BBP to harness our collective strength, advocacy and delivery opportunities.

Councillor Hancock has nominated to fill the vacancies until November 2022, after which time the Annual appointment of Council delegates at the commencement of the 2022/23 Mayoral term will occur for all internal Advisory Committees and external Committees and Networks.

The resignation of former Councillor Lamont also created a single vacancy on the Board of the Maroondah Foundation Trustee Limited. Item 18 of the Constitution provides for the Directors to be the nine (9) existing members of Maroondah City Council.
